Many of our publishers are also bringing out an excellent range of books about rediscovering the wonders in the natural world: from a new appreciation of winter from Helen Moat (*While the Earth Holds its Breath*) to chef Roberta Hall-McCarron's wonderful seasonal cooking (*The Changing Tides*), as well as former minister of the Church of Scotland, Helen Percy, discovering the joy and challenges of farming (*Skirly Crag*) and Neil Ansell, who, in his moving memoir, *The Edge of Silence*, finds new ways to appreciate and engage with nature as he loses his hearing.

Our children's and young adult publishers continue to make a brilliant showing, with lively picture books from Floris Books and Little Door Books, an amazing array of Middle Grade Fiction that star heroes such as comforting cats, good witches, cycling dragons, underwater Squirrels and William Wallace! There's also an enthralling historical fiction series from Scotland Street Press and readers favourites, such as *The Dandy* and *Beano* from the team at DC Thomson.

Such quality and variety shows that Scotland's publishing scene is as surprising, enjoyable and boundary-pushing as ever. For readers with enquiring minds, bones to be tickled, and hearts to be stopped, our brilliant publishers have something for you all.

Your Life Without Me

James Meek

St. Paul's Cathedral, one of the great buildings of London, has been blown up and destroyed. A schoolteacher, Mr Burman, is asked by the police to travel to the capital from his home in the north of England to meet the man who pleaded guilty to the crime, Raf, a demolition engineer, a former student of his, and the former boyfriend of his daughter Leila. Still grieving over the death of his wife Ada in a car accident, struggling to cope with Leila's silence and hostility, Mr Burman makes the journey south into a sinister system of interrogation and incarceration, towards the mystery of Raf's motives - and into the nature of his own family.

Compelling and compassionate, *Your Life Without Me* is an unsparing portrait of family dysfunction and of the contradictions embedded in the consumerist way of life.

James Meek is the author of seven novels including *The People's Act of Love* which was longlisted for the Man Booker Prize and won both the Royal Society of Literature Ondaatje Prize and the Scottish Arts Council Award. It has been published in more than thirty countries. He is a Contributing Editor to the *London Review of Books* and writes regularly for *the Guardian* and *New York Times*. He lives in London. In 2020, *To Calais, In Ordinary Time* was shortlisted for the Walter Scott Prize for Historical Fiction and longlisted for the Orwell Prize for Political Fiction.

For Emma


Ewan Morrison

Emma is a young genius Silicon Valley scientist who dies in a secret Al brain chip experiment. Her voice then haunts her father and helps him plan the killing of the Big Tech CEO who destroyed her.

It's a ghost-in-the-machine tale of bereavement and of a unique and conflicted love between a daughter and her father. *For Emma* delves deep into the moral conflicts of new human-computer technologies and asks whether humanity can survive our accelerating drive towards the future that promises us digital immortality.

Ewan Morrison is an award-winning novelist, scriptwriter and essayist. He has won the Saltire Society Scottish Fiction Book of the Year for his novel *Nina X* (2019), the Scottish Book of the Year (SMIT) Fiction Prize for his novel *Close Your Eyes* (2013), and Writer of the Year Award in the Glenfiddich Spirit of Scotland Awards for *Tales from the Mall* (2012). The film *American Blackout* (2014), co-written by Morrison and partner Emily Ballou, reached an audience of forty-five million and was debated in the U.S Senate. Morrison's feature film, *Swung* (2016), an adaptation of his first novel, was nominated for two BAFTAs and one international award.




David Quantick

This is a collection of 34 short stories written by Emmy award-winning writer, David Quantick. Some of them are very short, some of them are even shorter than that, and a few are quite long. What they all have in common is that they are a bit odd. There's science fiction, there's horror, there's at least one fairy tale, and there are some Christmas stories, not all of which are heart-warming. None of them are entirely conventional.

In writing these stories David wanted to see what would happen if the dead could talk to us through car stereos, if gerbils were cell phones, or if time was an ocean.

David Quantick is a veteran of seven fiction novels and twelve non-fiction books as well as as winning an Emmy Award for the internationally-acclaimed TV series, *Veep.* David began his writing career at the music publication, *NME* before contributing material to British comedy shows such as *Spitting Image, The Day Today, Brass Eye, Smack The Pony, The Thick Of It* and *So Graham Norton,* amongst others. In 2019, Quantick became a Visiting Professor with the University of Sunderland. In 2022, Quantick's first movie, *Book Of Love,* was released. In the same year it won Best Primetime Movie at the 2022 Imagen Awards. David lives in Hastings, East Sussex, with his wife and two children.




Shamiso


The River






No one likes death. It just happens to be our business.

The Man on the Endless Stair

When young author Euan meets decorated novelist Malcolm Furnivall, he feels his luck has finally changed. Malcolm takes Euan on as a protégé, inviting him to his secluded island in the Hebrides and vouching for him in the rarefied literary scene of the 1950s. But lately, Malcolm has not been himself. He is consumed by his work, and has become convinced that something strange and terrible will befall him. Malcom's suspicions soon prove well-founded; he is discovered murdered in his study, and his invaluable unfinished novel has vanished. Cut off from the mainland, with the killer on the loose, Euan feels both his mentor's legacy and his only chance at greatness slipping away – he must venture deep into Malcolm's labyrinthine mansion to find the manuscript before it falls into the wrong hands. But what he doesn't yet know is that the closer he comes to solving the mystery, the tighter he will bind himself to a fate sealed in time ...

Chris Barkley was appointed Writer in Residence by the Edinburgh Book Festival in 2022. He won the Oxford University Kellogg Writing Competition in 2021, as well as the Bedford International Writing Prize. He has been shortlisted for the Cambridge Short Story Prize and has had prose published in *TSS*, *National Flash Fiction, Darling Axe,* and *the Writers of the Future 35th anthology.* He lives in Edinburgh.

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Extract: The Silent House of Sleep

'Is it your contention, Dr Cuthbert, that Mr Everett died of natural causes rather than any unnatural poisoning?'

'It is not my contention; it is my conclusion. The body of Mr Everett was not poisoned by anyone other than the very ground in which he was laid to rest. The soil of the grave was rich in naturally occurring arsenic compounds. As may occur with any soil contaminants, these leached into his coffin and then into his body.

'I am not surprised that my distinguished colleagues found significant amounts of arsenic in his exhumed corpse. But assigning the origin of that poison to deliberate administration by the deceased's wife was erroneous. Mr Everett had clear evidence of extensive coronary artery disease, and although the state of the body at the time of my examination was poor, it was still possible to detect evidence of a large coronary thrombosis – a heart attack – that would ultimately have been the cause of his death.'

The judge as well as the jurors made notes as Cuthbert spoke, clearly delivering his expert testimony. When the pathologist had concluded, the judge turned his attention to the counsel for the prosecution.

'Your witness, Mr Carruthers.'

'M'lud. Now, Dr Cuthbert, are you really asking this court to believe that the victim, whose body was full of that vile poison, died a natural death?'

'My findings, sir, are based on the scientific method and have nothing whatsoever to do with belief. I am a scientist and I do not deal in beliefs. I deal in verifiable facts. 'Fact number one: the body of Mr Everett contained a high concentration of arsenic.

'Fact number two: the soil in which Mr Everett's coffin was interred contained even higher concentrations of arsenic.

'Fact number three: Mr Everett's exhumed coffin was heavily contaminated by arsenic absorbed from the soil. This absorption would have been promoted by the water-logged conditions of the grave and the thin, rather cheap wood used to construct his coffin.


'Fact number four: we initially hypothesised that Mr Everett's corpse in turn absorbed this arsenic from the contaminated wood of his coffin. To confirm this hypothesis, my assistant and I conducted a series of carefully controlled experiments in which we studied the rate of absorption of arsenic from soil samples into wood and thence into human flesh. We concluded that quantities sufficient to account for the concentrations of arsenic seen in Mr Everett's corpse could readily have been absorbed in the time period between interment and exhumation.

'Fact Number Five: Mr Everett's post mortem examination revealed conclusive evidence of his true cause of death, which was not consistent with arsenic poisoning.

'Therefore, I do not say I believe Mr Everett died a natural death: I know he did.'



The Witch, the Seed and the Scalpel



Art Deco Scotland: Design and Architecture in the Jazz Age

In an article for SMT Magazine and Scottish Country Life in October 1937, Kininmonth used the house to illustrate modernist thinking, arguing that:

Vertical lines produce a feeling of aspiration and long horizontal lines a sense of rest. Sloping lines, heavy projections, blank wall surfaces, ornament; each produce their own reactions. The sensitive architect will shape his buildings out of the forms and materials of his own time and imbue them with the personality of his own age.9 Such rhetoric typified the era's teleological approach to understandings of visual culture; the contrary argument that many other practitioners used repetitive, exaggerated horizontal lines instead of static vertical ones to capture speed and dynamism in buildings and interiors was evidently not considered. The article did, however, record for posterity the house's elegant original interiors, with chromed metal-framed dining chairs, abstractly patterned rugs and uplighters providing indirect illumination.10 In Glasgow's industrial districts there were very large audiences, many of whom did not mind so much if a film wasn't the latest, just so long as the cinema in which it was shown was close at hand and affordable. In such districts, Albert V Gardner produced designs for some high-capacity venues. His family were from Gloucestershire and they had moved to Glasgow in 1901, after which he began architectural studies at the Glasgow School of Architecture. By 1908, he had his own small practice and he designed his first cinema projects in around 1910-11. In 1931, the 4,002-seat Astoria on Glasgow's Possil Road was completed to his design and was claimed to be the 'world's largest working-class sound kinema'. Externally, it more resembled a factory than a place of entertainment, but the interior was brightly decorated in the jazz modern style.28 (The link between mass work in industry and the concomitant industrialisation of leisure was, of course, one frequently cited by cultural critics of the era and since.) Another Gardner creation was the Orient in the city's Gallowgate, opened in 1932, which was a 2,570-seater with an Art Deco ziggurat above the entrance, but, inside, the auditorium was contrastingly in the 'atmospheric' manner.29 For Ayr, meanwhile, he designed a smaller cinema of the same name, seating 1,648 and again with a striking Art Deco frontage while atmospheric within.




The Orient, Gallowgate, Glasgow Albert V Gardner, 1932 Bruce Peter collection







He also inspired through his words, becoming a highly renowned and respected medical editor and historian, publishing many papers and two books on diabetology.

The Wasted Years



This book is shaking up the formula-milk industry and global infant-feeding policy. Millions of young children die each year because of inadequate nutrition; millions more suffer the physical and cognitive effects of stunting and wasting; more children are both overweight and malnourished; global breastfeeding rates stay low. The current policy has involved decades of conflict and fails to deliver solutions that best serve infants and parents. Forsyth discusses the roles of WHO, governments, the formula-milk industry, breastfeeding groups, health professionals and parents, who are caught in the crossfire. He unpicks opposing philosophies and ideologies, and suggests the need for transformational change with new thinking, new priorities and new people.

Professor Forsyth is Honorary Professor of Paediatrics at University of Dundee. A consultant paediatrician since 1983, he was responsible for the Neonatal Service in Dundee and has had many Clinical Director roles including Medical Director for NHS Tayside, Chair of National Review of Neonatal Services in Scotland, and Chair of the Early Nutrition and Later Health Task Force at the International Life Sciences Institute in Brussels. He was commissioned to undertake advisory and health service reviews for the Scottish and UK Governments, and has contributed regularly to infant-feeding organizations such as the Baby Friendly Initiative. In 2012 he received an OBE for his contributions to children's health.

Phil Laws is a Consultant in Intensive Care Medicine and Anaesthesia at NUTH NHS Foundation Trust with interests in crisis communication.

David Mitchell (Ed.) is a consultant neurosurgeon at Newcastle University with research interests in surgical safety and decision-making, and has written a book on research analysis.

Emma Nunez is the Executive Director of Nursing, Midwifery and Allied Health Professionals (AHPs) and Deputy Chief Executive at Harrogate for District Health Foundation, with interests in professional standards, values and behaviours.



Extract: My Name is Samim

I envy my best friend Zayn, sitting next to me with no worries in the world. The dead have nothing to worry about. The worst thing that can happen to them has already happened.

Crowds of neatly dressed people with suitcases, backpacks and water bottles walk past me in the busy airport. To them, I'm just as invisible as my ghost friend Zayn.

'I wish I could leave my body behind on this bench like snakes leave their skins and become one of these people: normal,' I whisper.

Zayn snorts. 'What's so good about being normal?'

'Says the dead guy!' I chuckle.

The two guards beside me ignore my muttering. They're used to it. And anyway, they don't speak my language, Dari.

I take a deep breath, enjoying the aroma of fried food, coffee and perfume from the cafés and shops. The detention centre I live in stinks of sweat and chlorine.

The guards stare at their phones. They smell of aftershave and tobacco. My father used to smell like that.

The memories of my family in Afghanistan have faded and lost colour, like clothes left to dry under the sun for too long. After a bomb hit our neighbour's house, their clothes hung on the washing line in the yard for months. They were mainly baby clothes, and no one in the neighbourhood had the heart to touch them. The sun bleached the tiny blankets and shawls and they all became the same wishy-washy colour. My memories are just like that: faded and grey.

It's been a few hours since the guards brought me here, trying to deport me, but three flights have refused to take me on board. I don't know what we're waiting for now. I keep asking, but the guards don't talk to me. The one on the left has been playing a game on his phone all this time.

I sneak a peek, and he snarls at me, 'Mind your own business!'

'He hasn't won once since we've been here. Sore loser,' Zayn says, and I smile.

I'm grateful for Zayn. He's all I've got left. Even though he is dead.

A guard's phone rings. 'Hello,' he says, and then pauses for a while.

His only responses are 'okay' and 'yes'. I have no idea what's going on, and my heart starts pounding in my chest. I should be used to it by now, not knowing what will happen next, where I'll be taken and how I'll be treated, but I still worry. My hands sweat and my stomach gets tied up in knots.

'Breathe,' Zayn reminds me, and he starts counting pi. '3.1415...'

Zayn and I once challenged ourselves to see how many digits of pi we could learn. I learned 230 and Zayn learned twenty, but we told everyone that together we knew 250. It wasn't true, but it wasn't a lie either. And it was Zayn's idea, of course. He'd fake a dramatic cough after his twentieth number and motion for me to take over. People were impressed, and by the end, no one remembered that Zayn had only named twenty. We were famous in our neighbourhood for our pi powers, and Zayn loved it.

Counting pi calms me down. 3.14159265...

The man hangs up. 'He's not going anywhere,' he says to the other guard.


'No, please, I want to go!' I beg. I don't want to go back to the detention centre. Anywhere in the world is better.







6 / A copy of the English-language edition of the title
